
Association. Benefits of membership include purchase of club glasses, newsletter, attending meetings and voting on club issues, free wanted/for sale ads and classifieds and access to printed auction information in the Collector Glass News newsletter.

I stumbled on the Promotional Glass Collectors website during a Google search for others out there who collect glasses. While I admire the cartoon characters and movie-themed glasses, my personal collection is centered around the world of horse racing.

Kentucky Derby glasses are by far the most collected promotional horse racing glasses in the hobby. However, there are other series of glasses currently being produced and collected, featuring other race tracks besides Churchill Downs. Glasses may also feature specific races or even specific horses. The glasses come in all shapes and sizes, from the traditional "julep" style glass, "rocks" or "hi-ball" glasses, pedestal glasses (with and without handle), wine glasses, juice glasses, beer mugs ... you get the picture. As in any line of promotional glass collecting, the variety of your collection can be as narrow or as wide as you would like it.

I'm not sure how other glass collectors got their start, but mine was sparked during college. No, not a course on campus, although that would have been interesting! My buddies and I learned about the Kentucky Derby and watched it at a local betting establishment. During "Derby Week" many such places feature a special meal, accompanied by a signature alcoholic beverage. What college guy could pass that up?

The drink came in a souvenir glass, and we took our glasses home with us. In fact, most horse racing glasses were sold or given away as a souvenir. Shortly after graduation, while previewing "stuff" at an antique auction, I spotted a box of glasses, and noticed a few were vintage glasses of various types. My interest peaked when I realized there were also a few Kentucky Derby glasses pre-dating my college years. And the rest is history.





Oldest. The oldest glass I'm aware of was produced in 1938 for the Kentucky Derby (Churchill Downs, Louisville KY). Currently you may be able to pick one up for about \$3,000. And there are horse racing glasses other than the Kentucky Derby that date back into the 1950's and possibly even earlier.

Current. Other currently produced collectible glasses with horse racing themes are:

- Preakness Stakes (Pimlico Racecourse, Baltimore, MD): First glass 1973
- Belmont Stakes (Belmont Park, Elmont, NY): First glass 1976
- Breeders Cup. The best of the best horses compete every November at rotating racetracks: First glass 1985
- Jim Beam/Spiral Stakes (Turfway Park, KY): First glass 1980.

• Travers Stakes (Saratoga Racecourse, Saratoga, NY). In a nod to the premier race for 3-year olds, this race is nicknamed "The Mid Summer Derby": First glass 1990.

A Brief History. Other states hosting races and/or tracks that have produced a series of glasses include:

- Indiana The Indiana Derby
- West Virginia The West Virginia Derby
- Pennsylvania The Pennsylvania Derby, started in 1979; and The Adios Stakes for harness racing. (I'm not sure the Adios Stakes is still having glasses produced.)
- New Mexico The All American Futurity
- Illinois and New Jersey The Hambletonian. Early glasses are from the Du Quoin Racetrack at Illinois State Fairgrounds; later this harness race moved to The Meadowlands in East Rutherford, NJ.
- New York fostered several races in addition to the Belmont and Travers above, including The International Trot at Roosevelt Raceway, 1973-1987
- Ohio The Ohio Derby, held at Randall Park and Thistledown Racecourses; and The Cradle Stakes at River Downs
- Louisiana The Super Derby at Louisiana Downs
- Alberta, Canada The Canadian Derby at Northlands Park in Edmonton







I am aware of at least 75 different racetracks that have offered some sort of commemorative glassware. Undoubtedly there are more that I am not aware of ... yet. Some tracks and races are still current, some tracks have been closed for years and even decades. All manner of racing is represented on glassware: tracks that race thoroughbreds, standardbreds (harness racing), quarter horses, a few dog tracks, and even a few tracks from overseas.

Just a word about error glasses, variations, and sample glasses (stickered, and color/design variations). I very recently learned about a "prototype" glass which is believed to have been created for a Churchill Downs promotion. The proposed design was painted on a piece of acetate and taped to a glass to see how it would look before the glass was produced, and is slightly different from the glass that was actually produced. That glass came from the collection of Harry M. Stevens, who was the food and beverage provider for multiple sporting venues including Churchill Downs. Page 4

That is what led to the conclusion that the glass is more of a "prototype" than a traditional sample glass.

Several quite unusual glasses have been shown online and in various online groups, one was this Pinky and Brain glass that Stephen Zanca showed—similar to the Warner Brothers store glasses from 1990's. This Photo from Lee Hurst is of a Prototype Long John Silvers glass, Billy Bones. The following photo is from John Carpenter, a Kroger ad piece showing several Dog Peanut Butter Glasses and a great display of Welch's Howdy Doody glasses by Deacon Kane.











These two photos show different box sets of RCA glasses. The set on the second photo has a very interesting graphic on the box which has "Employee Suggestions" and "Help Ourselves" with a graphic of someone with a pencil, inside the "O". I wonder if this set was given to RCA employees. Also shown is a blue color (not black or black/red) Hopalong Cassiday dinner glass.







BOSCUL SALTED PEANUTS

Three 5" flower glasses sold recently that were filled with 7 1/2 oz. of salted peanuts. Apparently, after 70 odd years, no one knew that the popular Boscul flower glasses were filled with anything but peanut butter. These are likely circa 1950 and an interesting discovery for Boscul collectors.

7 1/2 OUNCE BOSCUL PEANUT BUTTER LID

A typical round red/green Boscul peanut butter lid for 7 1/2 oz. peanut butter exists and is very rare. The unsolved mystery is what exact container this fits. The answer is "out there".

PROTOTYPE FLOWER GLASSES

In addition to the very rare Boscul flower glasses noted as "one of a kind" in the Grayson-Carpenter PB glass book, three additions with completely new designs can be added: top name Calla Lily in orange/ yellow, top name Gladiolus in white/yellow, bottom name Hyacinth in white/yellow. For some of these, an additional glass or two has surfaced, indicating that a small number (6-12?) were made, but the designs were not put into production. It seems logical that the complex process of designing and making screens and mixing colors was not done to produce one glass, although it is possible.

THISTLEMANIA

The record selling Boscul Thistle glass, red flowers with green name at bottom, has sold for \$4700 and \$5800 recently. There are now known to be six, and possibly more, examples. Yet, it far surpasses in value the rarer glasses noted above.

SHEDD'S PEANUT BUTTER CITY SERIES

A Shedd's peanut butter advertisement sold recently on eBay that confirms there are 12 glasses in this series. These glasses are 5" tall with a thick bottom. The U.S. cities are Detroit, Indianapolis, Louisville, San Francisco, Washington, and the international cities are Cairo, Madrid, Rome, Rio de Janeiro, London, Singapore, Paris. What an odd choice of cities selected! Each glass depicts the city's most famous features. This is an interesting series and rather difficult to complete. Not found on glass411.info.

MONARCH PEANUT BUTTER "LUKE & LUCY" SERIES

This is a marvelous series of 28 known glasses, 5 %" tall with a thin bottom and marketed with Monarch peanut butter. These can be found on glass411.info and are known to some character glass collectors but are "new to me". There are seven known designs, each in one of four colors: red, blue, green, and brown. Designs: Indians, Circus, Picnic, Lemonade Stand, Santa, Snowman, and Ice Skating. Monarch Foods is a wholesale food company headquartered in Chicago. "Luke the Lion and Lucy small" starred in much of their advertising, as well as a lion head trademark. Luke and Lucy were assisted by a small army of bunnies doing various activities. The creativity and humor in these promotions is amazing and I rate them among the most desirable peanut butter glasses to collect. They can be challenging to find, especially the three winter scenes. Red and blue are the most common colors. While they don't demand your attention sitting on a shelf, the delight is in the details.




